WHAT WE DO

- » Undertake joint advocacy on just food, business and human rights, climate justice and finance and development. Furthermore, via special projects, we also engage in advocacy on Israel and Palestine, gender equality and sustainable production and consumption. For the latter, we are currently running the campaign “Change for the Planet – Care for the People”.
- » Enhance coordination and impact of programmes, by working together with local partners to promote people-driven change.
- » Challenge systemic injustice, inequity and destruction of nature, namely by tackling assumptions on growth, development and consumption and by promoting true alternatives.

FOREWORD

from the President



There is no doubt that people around the world are clamouring for change. This is expressed in various and unexpected ways, whether rejecting the political status quo or through protest. This desire to no longer go along with the business-as-usual model is in large part driven by growing social inequalities, environmental degradation and a world community incapable of protecting people from war and violence. The path to change however is murky and difficult to navigate, which can explain some of the diametrically opposing reactions we are witnessing.

In this context the work of CIDSE is more critical than ever. With its new 2016-2021 strategic framework, CIDSE offers a roadmap for change that is inclusive, just and aims at creating the conditions where all can live in dignity. At the core of this framework is a vision where respect for human rights, dignity, sustainability and citizen action are front and centre. It seeks to turn the world on its head for the better so that new structures that benefit all can emerge.

In the last year CIDSE continued to be dynamic, persistent and successful in its pursuit of global justice. It helped to pass EU legislation to regulate conflict minerals, launched a gender equality blog to highlight the transformative role of women in ending poverty, brought together various stakeholders from around the globe to discuss the powerful potential of agroecology to feed the planet while reducing carbon emissions, and contributed to a new African platform and partnership on fighting land grabs. Significant work continued on *Laudato Si'* and climate justice, which was reflected in CIDSE's participation in important events at the Vatican, the Polish Parliament, the World Social Forum, the UN climate change conference (COP22 conference) in Marrakech and many more.

Change does not happen easily. It takes courage to innovate and think differently. CIDSE and its member organisations have taken on the daring challenge to help bring about the transformation that the world is so desperately calling for.

I would like to thank outgoing President Heinz Hödl of KOO who during his three-year mandate helped foster and lead this process for the new strategic framework. As newly-elected President of CIDSE I look forward to accompanying the organisation as it lays the building blocks for future transformative change.

As Pope Francis reminds us in his encyclical *Laudato Si'*, which served as a profound source of inspiration for the strategic framework, even if the weight of the world feels all too much at times, there is another way forward:

"Yet all is not lost. Human beings, while capable of the worst, are also capable of rising above themselves, choosing again what is good and making a new start, despite their mental and social conditioning. No system can completely suppress our openness to what is good, true and beautiful. I appeal to everyone throughout the world not to forget this dignity which is ours. No one has the right to take it from us." LS, 205.

- 1) Communities regaining control over natural resources.
- 2) Facing climate change: just and sustainable food and energy models.

ACTING FOR TRANSFORMATION: PUTTING THE 2016-2021 STRATEGIC FRAMEWORK INTO ACTION

» As a next step in implementing the 2016-2021 strategic framework: “Acting for Transformation for a Just and Sustainable World”, CIDSE created a Systemic Change group formed of members committed to its vision.

The Systemic Change group was consulted on the development of the operational plan, which defines the steps to be taken over the coming years to implement the strategic framework, and will foster the links between policy processes and movement-building that systemic change requires. The group will continue to meet in the future to ensure that the actions taken by CIDSE over the next few years contribute to the transformative changes needed to create a just and sustainable world, where all can live in dignity.

The operational plan proposes new ways of working for this change to take place, and CIDSE will strengthen its roles as a connector, influencer and storyteller. In the next phase of implementation, CIDSE will re-organise its working groups around priority themes. Programmes and projects will bring together members, partners and other actors to address issues affecting the capacity of communities in the Global South to overcome the structural barriers of poverty.

» JANUARY

The new 2016-2021 strategic framework: Acting for Transformation was officially endorsed by the Board of Directors at their annual meeting. The process to develop the operational plan started in February.



CIDSE concluded its 50th anniversary celebrations with a reception at the Secretariat office in Brussels.

Along with the European Coalition for Corporate Justice and Amnesty International European Institutions Office, CIDSE organised a workshop on Human Rights Due Diligence where participants discussed the momentum for new strategies and future work.





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As part of the WSF and the World Forum on Liberation Theology, CIDSE co-organised the panel event “*LAUDATO SI’: A CALL FOR CHANGE*”. Panelists discussed how Pope Francis’ encyclical has triggered a global reflection on the paradigm shift and how communities are putting it into action. The panel featured guests from Nigeria, Thailand, Honduras, Brazil and Canada.

CONNECTING WITH OUR PARTNERS ACROSS THE GLOBE

» One of CIDSE’s key objectives is to strengthen its role as a connector. In 2016 staff members participated in several global events where they facilitated exchanges between groups from the North and South with similar goals and interests to identify areas of convergence and potential plans of action.

This form of movement building is a new way of working for CIDSE, but there are already positive results from the actions that took place in 2016. CIDSE was present at the general assembly of the Iglesias y Minería network in Colombia, and the MIJARC (International Movement of Catholic Agricultural and Rural Youth) quadrennial international general assembly in India. The World Social Forum (WSF), held in Montreal, Canada, was a particular highlight. Held for the first time in a northern country with the theme, “Another World is Needed, Together, it is

Possible,” the WSF brought together over 50,000 people striving to build a just world. CIDSE organised workshops with several of its members and partners, including Development and Peace (Canada) and CCFD-Terre Solidaire (France), on themes such as the call to change in *Laudato Si’*, how agroecology can cool the planet and remaining mobilised on climate change and sustainable lifestyles post-COP21. The connections made at the WSF showed how issues facing our world today affect us all and the only way to overcome them is through global collective action.

» FEBRUARY

Throughout the year, CIDSE monitored EU “trilogue” negotiations on due diligence regulation for conflict minerals. The successful conclusion of the talks in November was an important achievement, but only the beginning of putting this new legislation into practice.



CIDSE attended the international conference “Love never fails (1 cor 13:8). Perspectives 10 years after the Encyclical Deus Caritas Est” organised by the Pontifical Council Cor Unum.

“Change for the Planet - Care for the People” campaigners met in Brussels to evaluate activities held during the COP21 climate conference in Paris and to plan for the year ahead.



At COP22 in Marrakech, CIDSE organised the event “SOLUTIONS FOR SUSTAINABLE FOOD SYSTEMS IN A TIME OF CLIMATE CHANGE” in collaboration with several member organisations and partners.



CLIMATE AND AGRICULTURE: BRINGING PEOPLE'S SOLUTIONS TO THE FOREFRONT

» In 2016, CIDSE moved towards enhancing integrated approaches to climate and agriculture.

In September, CIDSE held a workshop on climate and agriculture with the aim of advancing agroecology as the basis for a sustainable food system that ensures food sovereignty and addresses climate change. The workshop provided an opportunity to explore synergies between the advocacy, communications, campaigns and international programmes of member organisations and to build on concrete examples from partners and allies in the North and South. Thanks to a process of sharing and learning, opportunities for stronger collaboration and integrated work at different levels were identified. Following the workshop, CIDSE published a series

of opinion articles from experts and partners to communicate on agroecology as a climate resilient food system. Ahead of the COP22 conference in Marrakech, CIDSE continued to advocate for climate justice and more ambitious targets within the framework of the Paris Agreement, which entered into force in November. At the climate conference, CIDSE participated in several side events and organised a joint webinar with the Global Catholic Climate Movement that provided insights from within the negotiations, as well as on citizen actions for climate justice from around the world.

» MARCH

On the occasion of International Women's Day, CIDSE launched a new monthly blog series on gender equality.



CIDSE facilitated a strategy session to develop a campaign against land grabbing in the Democratic Republic of the Congo by agribusiness Feronia. It also held an exploratory meeting on finance, corporate power and investments in agriculture.

CIDSE signed a Framework Partnership Agreement (FPA) with the European Commission (EC). This agreement confirmed the important role that CIDSE plays interacting with international and EU institutions.



The campaign launched its first video series: “STORIES OF CHANGE: SUSTAINABLE FOOD FOR THE PEOPLE AND THE PLANET”. The videos showcase tales of ordinary people putting into practice initiatives for sustainable living. The videos aim to inspire citizens to take action towards more sustainable ways of consuming and producing food, and to consider the role each individual can play to bring about meaningful change.



THE "CHANGE FOR THE PLANET - CARE FOR THE PEOPLE" CAMPAIGN GOES GLOBAL

» During its second year, the campaign “Change for the Planet - Care for the People” focused on citizen stories and initiatives on sustainable living, especially around food consumption and production.

In 2016, the campaign was present at several international events such as the European Development Days, where it co-organised an innovative workshop with allies and like-minded organisations that brought together experts and citizens to share experiences on sustainable alternatives to the current food consumption and production model. In collaboration with the Global Catholic Climate Movement, the campaign joined with a large youth delegation from eRko (Slovakia) to take part in the activities of the “*Laudato Si*’ Eco-Village” at World Youth Day in Krakow.

The objective of the village was to have participants reflect on the encyclical’s call for a profound ecological conversion. The campaign was present in a similar way at the World Social Forum in Montreal, where it co-organised a workshop with the youth delegations from CCFD-Terre Solidaire (France) and Development and Peace (Canada) within the Forum’s Youth Space.

» APRIL

Three Secretariat staff members travelled to Cambodia and the Philippines to visit with partner organisations of CIDSE members in those countries. The visit focused on agroecology, land grabbing, loss and damage, and climate justice.



CIDSE launched the last video of its “Stories for Climate Justice” series on the occasion of the signature ceremony of the UN Paris agreement by 174 countries and the EU.



CIDSE’s President and Secretary General visited MISEREOR and Cordaid in the first of a series of visits by CIDSE staff to member organisations to present the new 2016-2021 strategic framework and discuss its implementation. The last visit took place in Portugal with FEC.

By invitation of the coordination team of the West African Global Convergence on Land and Water Struggles (CGLTE), and with the support of CCFD-Terre Solidaire, CIDSE participated in the year-end assessment and planning workshop of the CGLTE at the Nyeleni Centre in Mali. CIDSE's engagement in this process further encouraged mobilisation of Church and non-Church actors against land, water and seed grabs in West Africa.



CONTRIBUTING TO BUILDING MOVEMENTS AGAINST LAND GRABBING IN AFRICA

» CIDSE, along with its members, partners and allies continued efforts to create and support spaces of exchange with grassroots movements on land and resource rights.

In June, with facilitation from FEC (Portugal) and CIDSE, participants and organisers of the 2015 Pan African Land Grab and Governance Conference in Kenya convened a follow-up workshop in Mozambique with a focus on land grabs in Lusophone countries. The conference was led by SECAM (Symposium of Episcopal Conferences of Africa and Madagascar), and participants developed concrete action plans to enhance convergence of grassroots resistance against land grabbing, particularly around the joint Brazil-Japan ProSavana project aimed at transforming the agricultural lands of the peasants of the Nacala Corridor in Mozambique into an agro-industrial zone.

In July, CIDSE enabled links between REBAC (Réseau Ecclésial pour le Bassin du Congo) and GRAIN, which allowed REBAC to strengthen its support to communities in the Democratic Republic of the Congo resisting agribusiness Feronia's palm oil operations. In October, REBAC supported the publication of an updated report that highlighted, among other points, ongoing human rights violations by the company and the growing resistance of affected communities.

» MAY

Hosted by Fastenopfer, CIDSE's annual COMED and Fundraising Forum took place in Baar, Switzerland. Workshops topics included challenges related to engaging with audiences, communicating complex stories and working together as a network.



CIDSE participated in the Bonn climate change negotiations where it contributed a written input for the session on agriculture and climate.

Together with Friends of the Earth Europe, SOMO and Bread for the World, CIDSE helped organise a legal seminar on the relationship between enforcement mechanisms and trade and investment regimes.





As part of the Treaty Alliance coalition, CIDSE delegation members at the 2nd session of the IGWG in Geneva joined with hundreds of other activists in advocacy towards governments as well as in a people's demonstration calling for concrete actions to “STOP CORPORATE IMPUNITY” and to “PROTECT HUMAN RIGHTS”.

SUPPORTING POLICIES THAT PLACE HUMAN RIGHTS BEFORE PROFIT

» In light of the growing life-threatening risks to human rights defenders, CIDSE's work on business and human rights took on particular resonance in 2016.

The assassination of Honduran human rights defender Berta Cáceres in February 2016 was a tragic reminder that communities in the Global South continue to experience violations of their rights in the face of transnational corporations and large-scale development projects. CIDSE vigilantly continued to pursue strong EU legislation on conflict minerals and co-organised a panel discussion featuring Abbot Léonard Santedi, Secretary General of the Congolese Bishops Conference, MEP Elmar Brok, President of the Foreign Affairs Committee of the European Parliament,

Jan Tytgat, Director Government Affairs EU-Benelux, UMICORE, and Frédéric Triest, Deputy Director of EurAc to debate proposed changes to EU regulation on conflict minerals that would weaken its impact. CIDSE and its members also engaged actively in the UN process for a treaty on businesses and human rights. A delegation of CIDSE staff, members and partners was present at the 2nd “Open-ended intergovernmental working group on transnational corporations and other business enterprises with respect to human rights” (IGWG) in Geneva in October.

» JUNE

CIDSE participated in the organisation of a workshop at the 2016 European Development Days that explored ways of moving towards more sustainable lifestyles, consumption and production through concrete experiences.



To celebrate the first year of Pope Francis' encyclical *Laudato Si'*, CIDSE launched a series of video interviews featuring high-level speakers, such as renowned climatologist Jean-Pascal van Ypersele.

Hosted by CCFD-Terre Solidaire, CIDSE Directors met with partners and allies from around the world in Lyon to discuss cooperation and joint efforts in support of CIDSE's new strategic framework.

MAKING GENDER EQUALITY A PRIORITY AT ALL LEVELS

» As a systemic cause of poverty in the world, CIDSE's approach to gender inequality took on increasing importance in 2016 and strategies were developed to integrate gender equality in all areas of CIDSE's work.

Following the presentation of its gender equality paper at the Holy See in 2015, CIDSE furthered its work in this area by making it a main transversal issue in the organisation's strategic framework so that a gender equality perspective is applied to all spheres of CIDSE's work. In support of this, a gender blog was launched to provide a diversity of voices expressing their views and experiences of women struggling against inequality. The blog had 15 entries that included a report from the 60th session of the Commission on the Status of Women, a firsthand account of a Cambodian sex worker, and a Brazilian peasant farmer describing how she is organising women's marches to denounce the sexism, poverty and

violence faced by women working in agriculture in her country. In June, CIDSE held a special meeting with its member organisations, partners and allies, where one of the discussions was centered on the way forward for working on gender. It was recognised that there is a need for more systematic monitoring of gender mainstreaming in CIDSE's work. To support this, CIDSE launched a baseline survey to map its own work and that of its members. The results are providing a starting point for the work ahead and a way to measure our success in supporting women in being recognised and empowered as fundamental actors of change.

» JULY/AUGUST

CIDSE, eRko (Slovakia) and the Global Catholic Climate Movement ran joint activities at the Eco-Youth Festival during World Youth Day 2016 in Krakow.



During the World Social Forum in Montreal, CIDSE co-organised events on ecological justice, agriculture and climate, resistance to extractive industries, citizenship and youth mobilisation, and *Laudato Si'*.

Development and Peace (Canada) kicked off celebrations to mark 50 years of solidarity with an event that gathered partners and allies present at the World Social Forum.



In the run-up to the COP22 climate conference in Marrakech, CIDSE participated in a conference organised by the Pontifical Academy of Sciences and the Pontifical Council of Justice and Peace that focused on responses to the climate crisis and the Paris Agreement.



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LAUDATO SI', A CENTRAL PILLAR IN BRINGING ABOUT SYSTEMIC CHANGE

» One year after the publication of the encyclical *Laudato Si'*, its message continues to inspire and guide the work of CIDSE and its members on environmental and global justice.

Laudato Si' has been identified as an essential component of CIDSE's work on systemic change within its new operational plan. In 2016, CIDSE and its member organisations continued to work with the encyclical to strengthen our work and to engage supporters and the wider Catholic community at different levels through workshops, conferences and other activities. To mark the first anniversary of *Laudato Si'*, CIDSE published an opinion article calling on policymakers to heed the encyclical's call to tackle

the root causes of climate change and inequality by implementing the Paris Agreement and the UN 2030 Agenda on Sustainable Development. Other CIDSE activities that promoted *Laudato Si'*'s key message for an ecological conversion included the presence of the "Change for the Planet - Care for the People" campaign at World Youth Day in Krakow and a presentation by CIDSE's Secretary General on *Laudato Si'* and the Paris climate agreement at the Polish Parliament.

» SEPTEMBER


CIDSE was invited to participate in the third meeting of the Latin American network Iglesias y Minería (Churches and Mining) in Bogotá, Colombia, which brought together 50 religious leaders and other allies from different countries.



As part of its workshop "Climate and Agriculture: Harvesting People's Solutions for Sustainable Food Systems", CIDSE organised an evening panel where different views on agroecology and climate-smart agriculture were exchanged.

CIDSE's Secretary General met Pope Francis at a conference on *Laudato Si'* in the Vatican. A few weeks later, he spoke at another event on the encyclical in the Polish Parliament.





Reflections on the post-2015 process made it clear to CIDSE that for fair development to take place, it must be addressed in an integrated way at all levels, taking into account the environmental, social and financial aspects. Thanks to this reflection CIDSE has gradually changed its way of working, integrating transversal issues more and more.

CIDSE'S JOURNEY IN THE POST-2015 PROCESS

» In 2016, CIDSE looked back at the process that led to the UN 2030 Agenda on Sustainable Development, which introduced the Sustainable Development Goals, and continued to advocate for a fair development framework at the EU level.

On the occasion of the European Development Consensus review, CIDSE issued a policy paper entitled “Make human rights and environmental protection the fundamentals!” that puts forward CIDSE’s position and vision for the renewed development consensus. It recommends an integrated approach that places human rights, gender equality, environmental protection, civil society participation, decent work and the rights of Indigenous peoples at the centre of the EU’s economic, development and climate

agendas. CIDSE’s input into the review was the result of a long journey by the network, which was traced and recounted in the online report, “CIDSE’s journey in the post-2015 process”. The report explains CIDSE’s engagement in the post-2015 process that led to the publication of the UN plan of action “Transforming our world: Agenda 2030 for Sustainable Development”, as well as the work behind key moments and messages delivered as a network and as part of broader alliances.

» OCTOBER

CIDSE participated in a seminar on *Laudato Si'* and the Sustainable Development Goals that took place during the MIJARC World Assembly in India. A few days later, it also took part in the People’s Forum on BRICS in Goa.



CIDSE joined in a media stunt calling on the EU to support the UN treaty process on business and human rights ahead of the 2nd session of the IGWG in Geneva.

A delegation took part in the Civil Society Mechanism meeting of the 43rd session of the Committee on World Food Security in Rome, while another attended the Monsanto tribunal in the Hague.





In the run up to the 14th session of the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD) in Nairobi, CIDSE was one of 331 worldwide civil society organisations that signed a letter to UNCTAD member states calling for the reaffirming and strengthening of UNCTAD's development mandate.

TAKING A SYSTEMIC APPROACH TO FINANCING

» In the wake of the global agreements on Sustainable Development and Financing for Development in 2015, CIDSE designed strategies with its allies aimed at addressing the outcomes of these agreements at both the international and European levels.

CIDSE participated in a meeting of the Addis Ababa CSO Coordinating group to develop clear objectives and ways to organise the work of the international civil society community that is working on the UN Financing for Development agenda and to monitor the implementation of the Sustainable Development Goals. At the European level, CIDSE discussed strategies to advance work on commonly agreed priorities within the European Financing for Development task force, particularly in relation to democratising tax governance by the creation of a UN tax body, monitoring the increased emphasis on private finance in the

Addis Ababa Action Agreement and in the implementation of the Sustainable Development Goals. All these discussions fed the internal reflection of CIDSE's Resources for Development working group in developing a systemic approach to working on finance in the new strategic framework. Based on this reflection, the group agreed that it was important to focus future work on addressing the large undue influence of private financial actors in society and the economy, and to develop alternate models of financing within the paradigm shift.

» NOVEMBER

CIDSE presented its views on the EU Development Consensus review at a policy lunch debate organised with sef: (Development and Peace Foundation).



A delegation attended the COP22 climate talks in Marrakech, where several activities were organised on issues, such as agriculture and sustainable food systems in a time of climate change and the 1.5°C challenge.

On the occasion of its 50th anniversary, Luxembourg member Bridderlech Deelen changed its name to Partage.lu.



FINANCES

CIDSE is mainly funded by membership fees and some additional resources for special projects. CIDSE's finances are reviewed annually by an external auditor.

LOOKING AHEAD TO 2017

The coming year will focus on the continued implementation of the 2016-2021 strategic framework and strengthening CIDSE's role as a connector, influencer and storyteller. Other highlights include the final year of the "Change for the Planet - Care for the People" campaign, which will look at renewable energy sources, and strong advocacy for a binding UN treaty on businesses and human rights in the lead-up to negotiations in Geneva in October 2017.

» DECEMBER

As part of its work on land, CIDSE participated in a workshop organised by the West African Global Convergence on Land and Water Struggles (CGLTE) in Mali.



After a comprehensive consultation process with member organisations, partners and working groups, the operational plan of CIDSE's strategic framework was presented to the CIDSE Executive Committee.

The Secretariat completed a baseline survey on gender equality mainstreaming across the network. The results will guide CIDSE's future work on gender equality.

» Working Groups
